

## Polish fighter plane in Romanian service

Fifty PZL P.11b aircraft were produced for *Aeronautica Regală Română* and delivered in 1932. Apart from the Gnome-Rhone 9Krsd (595 HP) engines, they were similar to P.11a. After the development of P.11c, *Aeronautica Regală Română* decided to buy a licence and produce the new model in I.A.R. Braşov. As a result, beginning in 1936 IAR Braşov built 95 IAR P.11F aircraft powered by Gnome-Rhone 9Krse (610 HP) engine. The new aircraft were used by 6 fighter units, while the older PZL P.11b aircraft were transferred to training facilities.


At the beginning of 1941, Romania launched serial production of a new fighter – the IAR 80. In the summer of 1941, fighter units began to be equipped with new equipment, and P.11F fighters were grouped in the *Flotila 3 Vânătoare* stationed in Galati (56 operational P.11F fighter planes). From the end of June 1941, units of the *Flotila 3 Vânătoare* took an active part in the Romanian offensive in Bessarabia, and then in the battles for Odessa. As the front moved east, P.11Fs were increasingly used for direct action over the battlefield and to support their own infantry. After the first campaign, all P.11 fighters were relegated to training duties and sent to Fighter schools in Râmnicu-Sărat, Turnu-Severin, Călăraşi and Ghimbav-Braşov. Between 1942 and 1943 the P.11s were used as trainers by many Romanian fighter pilots who would gain ace status during spring and summer 1944 while flying the IAR 81C and Bf 109G. In the first years after the war, due to the significant reduction of Romanian aviation, the P.11s were scrapped.





Unit was stationed in the vicinity of Ploesti with the task of defending the oil facilities against potential British air attack.










Typical camouflage scheme for Romanian PZL P.11 after overhaul — olive green over blue-grey. Red bands from previous markings are still visible on the fuselage and wings, painted over by thin layer of fresh paint. Two victory markings (a sketch of a PZL pilot with two Ratas on a leash) were painted — most probably depicting the two I-16s shot down by Adj.Stg.Av.Ioan Dimache on 29 August 1941.

The airplane left the overhaul facility most likely already after the start of the Operation Barbarossa and is presenting a clean camouflage without any overpaints of previous markings. It does however nicely show the mandatory markings worn by axis airplanes in the first months of the invasion of Soviet Union – 50cm yellow band on the fuselage and yellow wingtips.

The plane is still wearing a multicolor camouflage (khaki brown / terracotta / light green over blue-grey) applied in the first half of 1940. Cockades were overpainted and replaced with crossed in May 1941. The 25cm yellow band on the fuselage was overpainted on top with dark colour (most likely olive green) and light one (probably fresh blue-grey or blue-grey with white) on the undersurfaces. Tricolor on the rudder was overpainted with some lighter colour (probably khaki brown). Axis recognition marks (wide yellow band on the fuselage, yellow wingtips undersurfaces and yellow cowling) had been added. Of the particular note is the victory symbol on the rear fuselage — a PZL pilot with I-16 Rata fighter on a leash.
